Time for Reflection

Hospitality is the cornerstone of relationships

Hospitality is Heart Spirituality in action. It is more than just opening doors; it is about opening hearts. As Henri Nouwen beautifully expresses in Reaching Out, true hospitality creates a sacred space where strangers become bearers of gifts, and relationships deepen into transformative encounters. The biblical story of Abraham welcoming three strangers at Mamre is a profound example. His openness to offering food and rest to unknown visitors revealed a divine promise and blessing. Hospitality, therefore, is not merely a social custom but a spiritual practice—one that draws us closer to God and to one another.

In contrast, gossip closes this sacred space. It erects walls between people, distorts truth, and fosters mistrust. As Pope Francis reminds us, speaking ill of others "damages social bonds, poisons hearts, and leads nowhere." Gossip undermines the unity and harmony necessary for a thriving ecclesial community. It shifts our focus from seeing the gifts others bring to magnifying their flaws or missteps. This distraction keeps us from living the joyful, fraternal harmony to which Christ calls us.

St. Paul's exhortation in his letter to the Ephesians challenges us to use words that build up, not tear down. Words have immense power: they can create bridges or barriers, nourish relationships or erode them. To practice hospitality, we must also practice restraint in our speech, choosing kindness and truth over negativity and division.

The Missionaries of the Sacred Heart of Jesus emphasize this connection between hospitality and community life. Constitution number 32 calls for a spirit of family built on kindness, understanding, compassion, and mutual forgiveness. It is a vision where gentleness and humility prevail, where simplicity and humour lighten burdens, and where hospitality becomes a cornerstone of relationships. Such a spirit cannot coexist with gossip, which corrodes these values from within.

Hospitality invites us to see every encounter as an opportunity to reflect God's love. Gossip, on the other hand, turns us inward, feeding pride and judgement. To choose hospitality over gossip is to choose to see Christ in the other, to nurture the bonds that make us a family in faith.

May we cultivate this spirit of hospitality in our words, actions, and attitudes, creating spaces where love, trust, and unity can flourish. Let us resolve to speak words that heal, welcome with hearts open wide, and become communities that reveal God's blessings to the world.

LIFE IS A JOURNEY - 5 Day retreat with Fr. Chris McPhee msc March 10-15 2025



The retreat aims to transform pain into love, leading to deeper intimacy and joy, love, in and through the heart of Christ Jesus.

Opening: Welcoming session on Monday Guided Reflections and Input: Reflecting on the life experiences of Jesus and making connections with our own. Personal Journaling: Writing about personal experiences. Meditation and Prayer: Seeking spiritual growth and healing Rite of Forgiveness: Freeing what binds; letting go and embracing love. Prayer Companion: One-on-one guidance. Closing: Saturday before the evening Mass Reflecting on the retreat and setting future intentions.


Silence is a central part of this retreat; however, there will be times to share and interact with others on the retreat. The retreat can be for any adult.



With faith renewed and hearts aglow, may the miracle of Christmas bless you and those you hold dear. Amen.





Feast of St. John the Apostle 27 December

Reflection

St. John, the beloved disciple, rests his head against the breast of Jesus, close enough to feel the rhythm of His breathing. Each rise and fall of Jesus' chest speaks of life and love, the same love that shaped the universe and holds us all in being.

From this closeness, John hears the voice of Jesus—not just the words, but the subtleties and tenderness of the One who preached love, forgiveness, and mercy. This is the voice that spoke peace to the storm and compassion to the woman caught in adultery.



John's gaze meets the eyes of Jesus—eyes full of divine compassion, the same eyes that see us today, not with judgment but with unwavering love.

The breath of Jesus warms John's soul, the same breath that once animated creation and became the first cry of a child born in Bethlehem. It is this breath, the Holy Spirit, that continues to breathe life into us, filling us with grace and guiding us in every moment.

As we reflect on this intimacy between John and Jesus, we are invited to draw closer ourselves:

Do we hear His voice? When we listen attentively to the Word of God in Scripture, we hear the voice of Jesus speaking to us today. Are we taking time to reflect deeply on His Word?

Do we see His eyes? In prayer, we encounter Jesus' loving gaze fixed on us. He is madly in love with each of us, delighted by even the smallest glance in His direction. Do we allow ourselves to meet His eyes in trust and love?

Do we feel His breath? By being open to the Holy Spirit within us, we sense the life of Christ guiding our thoughts and actions. Are we attuned to the Spirit's inspirations in our daily lives?

To love Jesus is to grow in intimacy with Him, to rest against His heart and feel the nearness of His presence. Let us make room in our hearts to lean against His breast, to hear His voice, to see His eyes, and to feel His breath.

Let us live each day with the same closeness that John experienced, allowing our love for Jesus to transform our lives.

What It Means to be MSC

MSC's are recognised for who we are and the special charism we offer. Nothing grand, nothing spectacular, but rather ordinary, really, in a way like well Jesus. Jesus from his very core, offering heartfelt response to each and all, whatever their need.

Being MSC means being compassionate, being caring, being heartfelt, shepherding, being Jesus, or as we MSC like to say, *being on earth the Heart of God*.

Being MSC is how we are called, can contribute, can make a difference.

My thoughts turn to all those pilgrims of hope who will travel to Rome in order to experience the Holy Year and to all those others who, though unable to visit the City of the Apostles Peter and Paul, will celebrate it in their local Churches. For everyone, may the Jubilee be a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the "door" (cf. Jn 10:7.9) of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as "our hope" (1 Tim 1:1)

Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring. Even so, uncertainty about the future may at times give rise to conflicting feelings, ranging from confident trust to apprehensiveness, from serenity to anxiety, from firm conviction to hesitation and doubt. Often we come across people who are discouraged, pessimistic and cynical about the future, as if nothing could possibly bring them happiness. For all of us, may the Jubilee be an opportunity to be renewed in hope. God's word helps us find reasons for that hope. Taking it as our guide, let us return to the message that the Apostle Paul wished to communicate to the Christians of Rome.





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Vinnies Christmas Appeal



<u>Thank you for making the Christmas Appeal a great success</u>

Thanks to the enormous generosity of parishioners, students, staff and parents from St John the Apostle Primary School and St Francis Xavier College, Rotary Belconnen and Ginninderra and Gungahlin Lions, this year Vinnies Kippax prepared and delivered hampers for 77 families. There were gifts for 98 children. The hampers were delivered by 20 beautiful parishioners on Saturday 21 December.

Companions who received the hampers were very grateful for the assistance especially given the challenges of the rising costs of living. For these families the hamper and gifts allow them to celebrate Christmas with dignity and joy. They appreciate that people unknown to them genuinely care about them and wish to share the Christmas spirit with them. For many they draw hope from these acts of kindness and love. One lovely companion said as she received her hamper **'you've put sunshine in my heart this morning.**'



Each hamper comprised an array of food items including rice, pasta, cereal, condiments, pasta sauce, tea and coffee, tinned fruit and vegetables and Christmas goodies such as a plum pudding, custard, a Christmas cake, shortbread, lollies and chocolates, fruit juice or cordial, chips and nuts. We made up three sizes of hamper with large hampers for families of five or more, medium hampers for families of three and four and small hampers for singles and families of two. We included an eftpos voucher in each hamper, with \$50 for the small families, \$75 for the medium-sized families and \$100 for the larger families. This was made possible by the generous financial donations from parishioners.





Our estimates of the value of contributions made to this year's Christmas Appeal include **\$6330 for food items, \$2940 for toys and other gifts and \$5100 for eftpos vouchers.** We haven't received the final figures for financial donations to the Appeal, but they are likely to exceed the value of eftpos cards provided in the hampers. We will use the surplus funds to support our ongoing assistance for the poor in our local community.



A lot of work goes into planning and coordinating the Christmas Appeal with many hours put in by Conference members. However, the success of the Appeal is due to the generous support that we receive from our wonderful Parishioners at St John the Apostle, our local school and college communities and Rotary and Lions clubs. Many thanks for your gifts for the poor and marginalised in our local communities. You have made a difference in the lives of many people.
